It's been a brutal winter for illness.

The CDC continues to warn that flu season is far from over. In fact, it's being called the worst flu outbreak in nearly a decade. There are plenty of other bugs floating around. My wife and son are recovering from/fighting a nasty case of likely gastroenteritis, and it's quickly being impressed upon us that it is no exaggeration that kids who are enrolled in daycare bring home a constant stream of illness.

(Not long after this column was written, I fell victim to the bug myself!)

And while a short-lived virus can be extremely bothersome and inconvenient, we know far too well that many people, be it due to age, a weakened immune system, or other factors, may be in greater jeopardy than the rest of the population if they were to contract something like the flu. It's scary out there.

This doesn't even begin to touch the painful and frightening experiences we or our loved ones may have with something like cancer, Alzheimer's disease, Parkinson's disease, or schizophrenia. Our bodies are so frail and temporary. We are fragile and susceptible to things we dare not think about too deeply.

Fortunately, these bodies are temporary. We, despite all of the struggles with health that many of us deal with on a daily basis, can take enormous comfort in knowing that through Christ our *souls* have been saved. We have been washed clean in the blood of Christ. Jesus, who was known during his earthly life as a healer of physical ailments, is a healer of much more than that. While our salvation is secure, we should go to him continually as we seek spiritual renewal for our souls. We do this through prayer and we do this through the sacraments when we celebrate Baptism and the Lord's Supper. Sickness and injury to our bodies during our lives can seem all-encompassing, demoralizing, and even terrifying. But we can take comfort in knowing that, through the grace of God we experience in Jesus Christ, we will spend eternity with our Lord when our time in these bodies has come to an end.

Isaiah 53:5 reads:

But he was wounded for our transgressions, crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the punishment that made us whole, and by his bruises we are healed.

By his bruises we are healed.

During this Lenten season, and always, let that be a comfort to us as we struggle with fragile bodies.

When we have the flu or something even worse, we rely on the skill and training of our medical providers to take care of our bodies. But we know our souls are in the able hands of the Great Physician, our loving Savior, Christ Jesus.

2018 Per Capita


Per Capita

Per Capita provides administrative support to the mission of the Presbytery, Synod, and General Assembly. Among other things Per Capita provides office and clerical needs, accounting services for mission, and support to helping congregations find new pastors as well as assist candidates to prepare for the ministry. The Per Capita charge that the Kirk recommends is based on that assessed by the Presbytery. For 2018 the amount will increase to \$27 a member, a one dollar increase over the past three years. 






Join us for Easter Breakfast on Sunday, April 1.
